

JML staff contributed to the book, so be sure to order your copy and learn about the residents who moved Lynchburg forward in freedom between 1776 and 2026.




Paper Care Basics: How to Care for the Documents in Your Home Collection




NOVEMBER 12, 2025

In the early to mid 1700's Central Virginia emerged as the next frontier in westward expansion. A large percentage of the earliest settlers were members of the Society of Friends (commonly called Quakers). Learn about Lynchburg's Quaker families, whose names, homes, and plantations are familiar even 200+ years later.
