Marjorie & Joseph Freeman Colonial Churches & Their Role in Virginia



Before the Revolution, Virginia's churches performed many local government functions. It was at church that many of the Founding Fathers acquired their governing skills. Uncover the history of colonial congregations in Virginia, and learn more about the unique architecture of these churches.



Abolitionist, patriot, agitator? Who exactly was John Brown? Learn about the man who planned an insurrection at Harper's Ferry that sought to overthrow American chattel slavery. Learn how weapons like the pike were procured by Brown, and how the quest for freedom was foiled at the federal arsenal.




LIONS CLUB PAPERS Merci Train Materials JML.MS1122 Box 1, Folders 11-12

The French "Merci Train" rolled across America after World War 2. The train delivered a boxcar of goods to each state in gratitude for America's liberation of Nazi-occupied France.

JML has recently digitized some of the booklets and pamphlets that were distributed from the Virginia car when the train passed through Lynchburg in April 1949.


